
Refugee Policy Consultation Summary

The following data was collected from the public consultation on the future of the Island's Refugee Policy in late 2022.


- A total of 548 responses were received.
- The consultation attracted very polarised views.
- The value of this consultation lies within the qualitative data rather than the quantitative data.
- Despite clarifying that respondents were to answer in regard to refugees of any nationality, a percentage of respondents answered the consultation in specific relation to the war in Ukraine.
- Where the respondent answered 'strongly disagree' or 'disagree' to answer 7, the
 respondent would typically answer against any provision for refugees throughout the
 consultation. This factor is to be considered in any analysis of the quantitative data.
- Many respondents went on to add caveats to their responses.
- When reviewing open text boxes for comments, the most common themes/answers have been detailed.






• What constitutes as 'help' differs greatly among responses










Question 14: Do you think there are any benefits to the Isle of Man welcoming refugees to the Island?


- In line with Island's Economic Strategy








Question 20: Do you believe refugees should be eligible for benefits like Job Seeker's Allowance, Income Support, Employed Person's Allowance, and Child Benefit?
