SUMMARY: INTERVENTION AND OPTIONS

Briefly summarise the proposal's purpose and the intended effects

The purpose of the Bill is to place the convention of the independence of the judiciary from the executive on a statutory basis. The Bill achieves this by amending the Council of Ministers Act 1990. Particular duties are placed on the Council of Ministers (individually and collectively) to continue to uphold the rule of law and the independence of the judiciary.

What are the options that have been considered

Option 1: The Bill is not progressed.

If the Bill is not progressed there are no particular consequences. It is considered the Island's reputation will be enhanced by enacting the provisions in this Bill. Indeed it is considered appropriate in the 21st century to enshrine the principle of the duty of the executive to uphold both the rule of law and the independence of the judiciary in law. If the Bill is not progressed it is possible this could have a negative impact on the Island's standing.

Option 2: (preferred option): Promote the Bill as drafted.

In the event the Bill is promoted it is considered that by enshrining convention in statute it will signal the further development of the Island's constitution by highlighting the separation of powers as between the executive and the judiciary. Whilst in practice the Bill does not change what is already observed by virtue of convention, it does clarify responsibilities and duties on the part of Ministers, both individually and collectively.
